ORCHIDACEAE

Cypripedium cordigerum D. Don

Distribution: INDIA: Jammu & Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand (Garhwal, Kumaon); TIBET (S. Xizang); PAKISTAN; NEPAL and BHUTAN.



Cypripedium cordigerum D. Don

Habitat: In wet and shady woods, open Abies (fir) forest on outskirts of forests or in open glades and in Caragana (pea) and Juniperus bushes on south facing slopes, at altitudes of 2000-4000 m.

Population status/Cause for RET: Rare. Loss of habitat has caused serious damage to its natural populations.

Description: Terrestrial herbs, up to 60 cm tall with a very short and stout rhizome. Leaves 4-5, alternate, 5-18 x 4-11 cm, orbicular to lanceolate, plicate, almost scattered. Flower solitary, 7-10 cm across, pale yellow to white; sepals longer than lip; lip bag shaped, white, often with purple spots outside; ovary fusiform, glandular pubescent. Capsules clavate, ca 3.8 cm long.

Fl. & Fr.: June-August.

Commercial/Ex-Im data: 150 kg of live C. cordigerum has been exported to the US from India during 2002 (CITES permit No. A 2609).
